

Electricity generation licence application form

Purpose of this form

This form must be completed by persons applying to the Essential Services Commission (the commission) for a licence to authorise electricity generation in Victoria. Electricity generation includes battery energy storage systems.

Basis for this form

Section 18 of the *Electricity Industry Act 2000* (the Industry Act) provides that a licence application must be made in a form approved by the commission. This is the form approved by the commission.

Use of this form and the applicant's responsibilities

A licence application may be made by any legal person including, without limitation, individuals, incorporated associations, unit and other forms of trusts and corporations. Entities that are not a legal person (for example, an unincorporated joint venture or a partnership) cannot apply for a licence.

For the purpose of this application form, reference to the term "Officer" includes the applicant's directors and secretary, and other persons who make or participate in making decisions that affect a substantial part of the business (for example, Chief Executive Officer, Chief Financial Officer or General Manager).

The applicant should list the information requested in the spaces provided in this form and enclose additional information when required.

The applicant must take all reasonable steps to ensure the information provided in the application form is complete, true and correct.

An officer of the applicant is required to make a declaration to this effect in the application form. Failure to disclose information or misrepresent any matter relevant to such information may result in a licence not being issued or in the revocation of a licence later.

It is a criminal offence under section 61A of the *Essential Services Commission Act 2001* to provide the commission with false or misleading information or documentation.

The applicant is responsible for providing the commission with current, accurate and relevant documentation. It is the applicant's responsibility to make all reasonable inquiries to obtain the information requested by this form.

Providing accurate and relevant information and a complete application (answering all questions and providing all information) will assist in timely processing of an application. All applications are assessed on a case-by-case basis. If insufficient information is provided with an application, we will contact the applicant about the requirement for additional information to be submitted before the application is considered further.

It is expected that the applicant has read our <u>Guideline</u>: <u>Applications for electricity and gas industry</u> licences before completing this form.

It is the applicant's responsibility to ensure its compliance with legal obligations when applying for a licence

Licence conditions

Section 20 of the Industry Act authorises the commission to issue licences subject to conditions as decided by the commission. Licences are published on our website. We recommend the applicant familiarise itself with the relevant standard conditions and be confident that it can comply with those conditions prior to applying for a licence.

We will consult with relevant government, industry and consumer groups on the licence application through a public consultation process. Applications and/or supporting information that is not confidential will be made available on our website.

The generator is currently connected to AusNet's electricity distribution network via a 22kV connection point located at AusNet's 22 kV Wonthaggi Zone Substation.

2.3 Registration with the Australian Energy Market Operator and generator performance standards

RWF currently has an exemption from the requirement to register with AEMO under clause 2.2.1 of the National Electricity Rules on the basis of its appointment of Progressive Green Pty Ltd as its intermediary.

Progressive Green is currently registered as the Generator for the Wonthaggi Wind Farm and has classified the generating units as market non-scheduled generating units.

The Wonthaggi Wind Farm has been connected to the AusNet distribution system since commissioning in 2006, and, as far as RWF is currently aware, there have been no technical compliance issues.

2.4 Licences held in other jurisdictions

RWF does not currently hold any electricity or gas licences or similar authorisations in any other jurisdictions.

EDL LFG (VIC) Pty Ltd is a related body corporate of RWF. It has held a licence since 12 December 2012 under the *Electricity Industry Act 2000* (Vic) authorising it to generate electricity. The licence currently covers the Brooklyn and Clayton Landfill Gas Power Stations connected to the national electricity grid across Greater Melbourne. It also previously covered the Broadmeadows, Corio, Narre Warren, and Springvale Landfill Gas Power Stations before they were decommissioned.

Note as an operating power station, RWF has a straightforward contractual structure, with a core connection agreement with AusNet, an agreement whereby Progressive Green acts as its intermediary in the NEM, and a contract with Vestas for the maintenance of the wind turbines.

EDL has built, owned, and operated distributed electricity generators across Australia since 1988, including large-scale solar, wind, batteries, and diesel, natural gas, waste coal mine gas, and landfill gas fired power stations. Technical performance obligations govern more than 750MW of EDL generation assets spread across Australia, with generator performance standards agreed with AEMO and various NSPs governing over 400MW of distributed generation across multiple registrations and agreements in the NEM and WEM. EDL's Operations and Engineering staff have and remain committed to dispatching these electricity generation assets in line with those standards each and every day and have done for over three decades.

3. Financial viability

3.1 Financial resources

Regional Wind Farms Pty Ltd (**RWF**) is part of the Energy Developments Group headed by Energy Developments Pty Ltd (**EDL**).

The EDL Group is one of the largest distributed and remote energy generator companies in Australia and has been operating in Australia for the last 35 years. Its current Australian operations include wind farms, landfill gas-fired power stations, waste coal mine gas generating plant and remote energy facilities. It is responsible for 428 MW of electricity generation directly connected to the national electricity grid and Western Australian grid and a further 332 MW supporting remote facilities. The EDL Group also has operations in the UK, the USA, Canada, and parts of Europe.

As a large registered Australian proprietary company, EDL is required to lodge annual financial reports with ASIC. These annual financial reports include declarations that, in the opinion of the directors, there are reasonable grounds to believe that these entities will be able to pay its debts as and when such debts become due and payable.

EDL's most recent annual financial report, which contains such confirmations, was lodged with ASIC on 29 March 2023.

As RWF operates compliant with the Corporations Act 2001 (Cth), it is financially viable and has the financial resources to sustainably operate the Wonthaggi Wind Farm (which it has done since acquisition).

Several members of the EDL Group are registered as Generators in the National Electricity Market. RWF has appointed an intermediary, Progressive Green Pty Ltd (trading as Flow Power) to be the registered Generator in the National Electricity Market (NEM) for the Wonthaggi Wind Farm; however, the obligations associated with being a market participant are largely passed through to RWF.

As the parent entity of RWF, EDL continues to be a robust and financially viable company and demonstrably has the financial resources to support RWF's sustainable operation of the Wonthaggi Wind Farm over the long term and in compliance with relevant laws.

4. Fit and proper person

The applicant must answer all questions in this section.

5. Commission objectives

The Wonthaggi Wind Farm has been in operation since 2005 and therefore the issue of a Generation Licence for this Wind Farm would clearly be in accordance with the Commission's objectives, as it will enable the Wonthaggi Wind Farm to keep generating sufficient electricity to power, on average, approximately 5,600 Victorian homes in a regional area of Victoria, without the need for new infrastructure and associated environmental impacts.

In addition, the continued operation of the Wind Farm will assist the State of Victoria meet its ambitious and world-leading Emissions Reduction Target of achieving net zero emissions by 2045.
